







RMetS Climate Change Forum Thursday 20th October 2022, London, UK

Through the United Nations, Governments have committed to holding global warming to less than 2°C above pre-industrial levels and will make efforts to keep the rise to below 1.5°C. The recent Sixth Assessment Report of the IPCC makes it clear that to achieve this goal, net global greenhouse gas emissions need to fall to zero by 2050. What does this mean in practice? Are we on track to reach net zero by 2050? If not, what more needs to be done? It is clear from recent weather events that we need to improve our resilience to climate change through more effective adaptation strategies – but where should our priorities lie?

To address these challenges, the Royal Meteorological Society is holding a Climate Forum on Thursday, 20 October 2022, at the Coin Street Conference Centre, London. The morning session will focus on planned mitigation and adaptation actions and consider what more is needed, particularly in the UK, looking at three key sectors – food, buildings, and transport. It will draw on the IPCC's Sixth Assessment Report exploring a 2050 vision for climate change and our responses to it.

The afternoon's interactive sessions will allow attendees to contribute their views on these three sectors' near-term priorities and actions to help the UK achieve net zero and climate resilience by 2050. The Society will use the messages from this session to inform decision-makers, so it is a significant opportunity to let your voice be heard.
